# 'THE PICTURES' AT GREENSBOROUGH (Part 2)

Around June 1930, the 'New Greensborough Pictures' began in the hall providing local entertainment as well as supporting the local community. 'The Masonic Hall appeared very bright on Monday last, when pictures were shown under new management. Brilliant lights were aglow outside the hall and the interior showed that many improvements had been effected.'

Advertised for to-morrow (Saturday) night, Lon Chaney in "Laugh Clown, Laugh," is the attraction at the New Greensborough Pictures.
The picture is adapted from the famous stage play. Alice White and Arthur Lake are aso on the same bill in an up-to-date romance of high school heroes and college flappers who combine in making "Harold Teen," a picture that will have you laughing from start to finish. The above, together with the short comedy, "Do Gentlemen Snore," is a programme that no one should miss. The projection plant has been refitted and very steady and clear pictures are assured. In the near future a special non-synchronous equipment giving new sound effects and also suitable and modern musical scores, will be intsalled.

It was obvious that the picture theatre and films being shown had improved substantially and were therefore supported well by the local community. The theatre also supported local groups too, such as the Greensborough Cricket Club, The Relief Organisation and Fire Brigade.

That patrons appreciated the management's change of policy was shown by the crowds that attended at both the matinee and evening performances on Saturday last. Everybody enjoyed the excellent programme presented and as this comment is general the management is to be commended on its choice of programmes, only the best available pictures being presented. As usual there will be a suitable programme presented for the children at the matinee to-morrow (Saturday), but in the evening "The Little Wildcat" will be the star attraction. It is a sparkling comedy drama in which aviation plays an important part, mingling humor freely with romance. Among future attractions are Monte Blue in "From Headquarters" and Milton Sills in "His Captive Woman." Patrons are again reminded of the evening price, which is one shilling for all. Make an appointment at your own show to-morrow night, when you are assured of a tip-top programme.

The "Tarzan" serial has concluded, and the prizes were presented at the matinee on Saturday. The following are the winners:-Maxwell Spence, fountain pen; Reginald Glenny, torch; William Smith, table tennis set; Evelyn Horne, toilet set; Beatrice Stock, lady's handbag. The winner of the wristlet watch has not yet been finalised. The first episode of the new serial, "The Return of the Riddle Rid-The first episode of the new er," will be shown at the matinee tomorrow, and also at the evening performance. This is an adventure serial in which William Desmond and Lola Todd play the leading roles. Buster Keaton will also be shown in "Spite Marriage," a story full of thrills, laughs and romance. Also "Our Gang" in a side-splitting comedy, "Chicken Feed." On the evening bill "The Terror" is the star attraction. It is based on Edgar Wallace's celebrated stage thriller, and is a mystery film which is claimed to be the creepiest and at the same time the most absorbingly amusing film of its kind ever screened. This picture is a Warner Bros.' special and makes ex-cellent entertainment for all movie fans. A 100 per cent. technicolor picture, "The Viking," will be shown on Saturday, November 22.

I have not been able to find any mention of the Picture Theatre or regular films being shown between 1931 and 1937. However, many functions were held at the Greensborough Masonic Hall during those years - such as concerts, Euchre nights or film nights that were held purely for fund raising.

#### Relief Organisation

Comedy Club Concert.-On Saturday night the Masonic Hall was filled to capacity when the "Gladwill" Comedy Club presented that mirthprovoking comedy, "What Happened to Jones." The cast, consisting of local amateurs, under the stage management of Mr. J. K. Sanders, acquitted themselves most creditably. From start to finish the embarrasments of Mr. Jones kept the large audience in continuous laughter, whilst clever acting of the supporting company, together with the "make ups" and lighting effects, was a surprise and a revelation of local talet. The proceeds were equally divided with the local relief organisation.

Picture Night.—Another effort to augment the relief fund will be a movie representation of Emerson Hough's great story, "The Covered Waggon."



On 26th August, 1938 an article in the local paper refers to a letter that Heidelberg Council had received from the Health Department, concerning the showing of moving pictures at the Masonic Hall. At that stage however, pictures had ceased being shown there.



At the meeting of the Heidelbert Council on Tuesday a letter was received from the Health Department stating that it had threatened legal proceedings against the trustees of the Masonic Hall, Greensborough, if the showing of moving pictures were permitted from the flimsy cinema cabin in use. As the pictures were no longer being shown there, the letter was merely received.

On 17th August 1940, the Greensborough State School held a picture night at the Masonic Hall to raise money for the Patriotic fund – so perhaps whatever 'Health Department' issues there were, had been dealt with by that time.

Many Functions have been held to Support Miss A. Brown – Greensborough Red Cross nominee. On March 7th, 1942, Miss Alice Brown sang at the Greensborough Pictures. The manager, Mr Tregonning was thanked for permitting a collection to be made on behalf of the appeal.

Eltham and Whittlesea Shires Advertiser Fri 20 Feb, 1942 p4

During the 1930s and 1940s the picture theatre provided a great deal of pleasure to many local

residents. Allan Bishop remembers a group of young Greenhills folk would walk to Greensborough on a Friday/Saturday night during the late 1940s to go to the pictures. Pat Shaw – from the Milk Bar next to Skals' Garage in Main Street – would sing during interval, accompanied by someone else playing the piano.

**In 1949**, Lou Riley leased the theatre situated at 25 Main Street, Greensborough, and operated it quite successfully for many years.

In 1951, the theatre known as the Victory, was showing 'Stage Fright' with Jane Wyman and Richard Todd – a 1950 British thriller. *The Age 13 July, 1951 p12-13.* 

During the 1950s, Drive In movies began to appear, along with the introduction of television. However, despite that, during the 1950s and 1960s the theatre was still well attended.

**In 1956**, the building (known as Victory Theatre) was advertised to be sold by tender – but 'no tender necessarily accepted'.

On 13 May, 1958, Lou purchased the building from the Masonic Lodge for £10,000, and in 1961, refurbished the theatre to include the new cinema technology of Cinemascope. Lou used seating and some fittings from the Regal Theatre in Hartwell which had closed earlier. Also at this time, the name of the theatre was changed to 'Ashril Cinema.' (From an article written by Jillian Riley – Lou's daughter)

CAARP (Cinema and Audience Research Project) lists L.A. Riley as the exhibitor from 1949 to 1967, and lists Pennell & Bouncer as Manager and Exhibitor of Ashril Cinema from 1968 to 1974.

By June 1972, at the request of Mr Peter Pennell — leasee and manager of the Ashril Cinema, a survey was conducted to see if there was sufficient financial support to form a public company to take over the business of the theatre. The lease was due to expire in September 1972, and Mr Pennell had arranged to advertise his equipment for sale in July or August. (Community News — 26 June, 1972 p1, p15. Edition No. 4/72)

Unfortunately, the cinema closed.

Around October / November 1978, a new 'Twin' Cinema was built in Greensborough. This was quite unusual as both Village and Hoyts Cinemas operated from the same area - having one screen each. At one end of the counter you could purchase Hoyts tickets, whilst at the other end you could purchase

Village tickets. The cinemas were located off 'The Circuit' with the entrance via the car park and the newly built Greensborough Plaza adjoining the cinemas. As you walked into the cinema, the counter was directly in front of you, whilst to the left and downstairs were the two luxurious cinemas and toilets.

There was a huge difference between this cinema experience to that of the former Greensborough Theatre. The quite dark, no windows, casual type foyer and counter, was changed to a very light filled, noisy and busy area – with the women attendants even wearing a uniform that consisted of a long length rust coloured skirt and cream coloured top. The entire experience indicated that the little township of Greensborough had certainly modernized as far as a picture theatre!

According to Elaine Greig (who worked at the cinema for approximately 6 years), **Star Wars** and **Superman** were two of the first major films shown at the theatre.

**The Age – Nov 16, 1978 p22.** Hoyts Greensborough was screening **Star Wars**, whilst Village Greensborough was screening **Blue Fin**.

CATHS (Cinema and Theatre Historical Society) lists the Village/Hoyts Twin cinemas as operating from 1978 to 1989.

Around **1995**, (7 December 1995 according to CATHS), a new "Hoyts' Multiplex cinema was built as part of the Greensborough Plaza.

The entrance to the cinemas was then within the shopping complex.

#### Imagine...

# 'Heritage Walks for the time of the pandemic'

Kathy Andrewartha from the Mont Park to Springthorpe Heritage Group contacted us recently to tell us about some walks they have devised, and which you can take, self-guided, with help from these resources. (Click on the first link for the guides)

In this time of the pandemic, we cannot do our usual Walking Tours of the Mont Park sites, so we have developed Walking Maps which people can download and follow for themselves around five Walks, or just take the Walk 'virtually' online.

Each Heritage Walk features one of the former asylum/sanatorium/hospital sites, in which some of the Heritage buildings have been preserved or re-purposed.

The Maps comprise points of interest with photographs of the landscape and buildings, short histories and some insight into the lives of the people who lived and worked in the area. Many veterans from WWI and WWII spent time at the hospitals recovering from post-traumatic stress disorder or tuberculosis.

(i) The main **Mont Park to Springthorpe Heritage Trail** investigates the seven former Mont Park Asylum buildings which remain on this site. It is an easy 30 minute stroll, past the white Spanish Mission style Hall and ancient river red gums, cypress, oaks and palm trees.

(ii) Another Walk traces the old railway line (closed in 1964) from 'Macleod Station into the Mont Park' asylum, and wanders back through the Macleod Estate which honours nine Victoria Cross recipients

(iii) The Walk which starts in the Gresswell Forest Wildlife Reserve around 'Gresswell Hill' is where two TB Sanatoria existed, served by the huge Water Tank designed by Sir John Monash in 1912. See

- (iv) Over near the Polaris Shopping Centre on Plenty Road there are another seven buildings which formed part of the **Larundel Hospital** complex. Several of these buildings are being utilised by La Trobe University to extend their campus north of the La Trobe Wildlife Reserve. This Reserve formed part of the original Mont Park Hospital site, being home to the tennis court, cricket pitch and football ground.
- (v) in 'Bundoora Homestead' in Bundoora Park was used as one of the Wards of the Bundoora Rehabilitation Hospital for military veterans, from about 1924 to 1994. The original 50 buildings of the hospital complex extended down to the area of the current Children's Farm, but this

short Walk covers about a quarter of this area, around the only remaining building, the Bundoora Homestead Art Centre

We hope you are able to get out and enjoy these Heritage Walks
