

### **President's Report**

The Victorian Level Crossing removal authority has been in touch regarding our input at the Greensborough and Montmorency stations which appears to be still in its formative stage but hopefully will gather pace soon. I have provided some photos and requested that space be provided to promote the Society and local history either in printed or electronic form, the latter being shown regularly on the monitors within the waiting room.

#### Renovations

As reported in the March Newsletter, we packed our collection and furniture and sent it to Storage King in Briar Hill on 30/3/2022. Computers are being upgraded at Noel's. Our now empty Resource Centre was ready for some big changes; however, due to a few planning issues with this old building, there was a delay in work commencing.

The builders took over the site on Monday 30/5/2022 and work began in earnest the following Monday. Some internal demolition, relocation of our storage shed, removal of tree stumps and preparation of the veranda took place in that first week.

# Local History Collection at Diamond Valley Library



Public libraries play an important role in sustaining our collective heritage and culture and in promoting a sense of history and belonging in the local community. Local history collections tell the story of the roots, evolution and contemporary circumstances of the local area and its residents, as they provide an understanding of the past. They are of value to future generations.

Diamond Valley Library was opened in 1984 as part of Victoria's 150th year celebrations. The library previously occupied space in the Shire of Diamond Valley Civic Centre. The Local History collection has been in existence

since at least that time. It is one of four across the Yarra Plenty Region (the others are at Eltham, Ivanhoe and Mill Park libraries).

The main focus is the geographic area covered by the former Shire of Diamond Valley, including Diamond Creek, Greensborough, Watsonia, Yarrambat, Plenty and parts of Bundoora. It includes material of relevance to the present City of Banyule and Shire of Nillumbik.

A significant collection of historical photographs from the 1860s to the 1990s (now digitised and accessible online) were donated to the library soon after it opened by the Nillumbik Historical Society, based in Diamond Creek.

The relatively small collection is principally paper-based. These include published books, documents, photographs, pamphlets, unpublished works and compilations, press cutting files, newspapers and municipal records.



Major themes include early settlers, the development of local townships and communities, local institutions and organisations, urban development and housing, the development and construction of

the Greensborough shopping Centre and other facilities, social and urban planning issues, the natural environment, the development of the library service, the Diamond Valley Art Collection and limited information on indigenous history.


Editions of the *Diamond Valley News* (*Leader*) were regularly collected forming a significant resource for local history. 1966 to 2016 are held in hard copy. A newspaper indexing project (accessible via the catalogue) is ongoing.

In 2016 YPRL published *Fine Spirit and Pluck: World War One Stories of Banyule, Nillumbik and Whittlesea,* a collaborative project in response to the Anzac Centenary. \*

Recent additions to the collection have included publications relating to living during the coronavirus pandemic. Since the redevelopment of the library completed earlier this year, the collection has been moved to open access, perfect for browsing. The collection can only be accessed in the library. Some items are unique and fragile and we encourage a "handle with care" approach when using the collection.

Search the catalogue via the website at yprl.vic.gov.au. Once on the catalogue page, choose the options "online images" to search photos and documents.

# It's Winter, the Footy Season – a look back at the "Nursery for Footballers"

#### An article from the Hurstbridge Advertiser, October 3,

**1930:** This district is the nursery for several prominent footballers. From Diamond Creek the brothers Coventry of Collingwood – Syd (captain and also winner of the Brownlow Medal) and Gordon, champion goal kicker, and Edmonds, also in Collingwood. From Greensborough Club, Joe Poulter, formerly of Collingwood and South Melbourne, and at present coach to Echuca; Clem ("Digger") Splatt, of Hawthorn, until incapacitated, and last, but not least, Stan Judkins of Richmond, who has just been awarded the Brownlow Medal. Will all teams please note? We have several more promising colts deserving of a tryout in the near future.

This made me wonder who else might have come from Greensborough to the VFL, now the AFL? I consulted Rex Smith who provided the following information on Greensborough Football Club players:

#### Correction to the March Newsletter:

In our article on Gus Lines, I incorrectly added to Norm's article: *"Locally, he was a player and president of the Greensborough Football Club; Gus captained the football club to its Premierships in 1920 and 1922."* The dates are incorrect: In 1920 and 1921 Greensborough Football Club was captained by Fred Honeychurch; Harold Hodgson was captain in 1922 and 1923. 1922 was the inaugural year of the DVFL and Boro were premiers. A.K. Lines was captain in 1925 (a premiership year) and also in 1926.
